In a similar vein the two village schools, the nursery and the churches of both villages are all institutions that we can hopefully work together with to improve our lovely village for everyone.

The hall now has full WIFI access free to be used by hall users this has been possible due to the parish council for the community and hires of the hall.

Web site has been developed and being improved so that hall booking can be take on line with information about the hall prices for hire and so on to promote events and advertising of future events club activities etc.

This is an on-going improving site that will grow and change with time.

The village hall has taken on one of its largest projects to date as in the purchase of the village green / Bridge Meadow and the development up keep of the green to be used for leisure sport meeting place a community green space to be enjoyed by all including the use of local organisation and Bramfield Primary school for the sports days etc.

The decision was made the Village Hall Charity and its governing committee would take on this task as it would involve fund raising applying for grants and funds that only a charity could manage this would enable it to access to lottery community fund and other organisations, moneys have been pledge by the local community but fund raising will be needed for the full amount and continuing up keep and maintenance of the green.

Maintenance is an on-going thing with the hall the floor needs to be resealed some of the exit lights need replacing and many other jobs that happen during the year as always this costs money with funds dwindling and with costs keep going up as in heating insurance and all the other things.

Hall usage has fallen in the last year with some of the regular users giving up to low numbers of members hall hire has also dropped off less party's and celebrations with this in mind hall committee has been looking and organising other events to rase funds.

To finish we are always looking for new committee members part time of full time people just to help out at the odd event or give us some ideas on events help with maintenance grass cutting repairs etc.

Bramfield Parish Council Report March 2023

Since first opening our doors in 2008 Bramfield Stepping Stones Pre-school has gone from strength to strength. During this time we have had literally hundreds of Children pass through our doors, with our first cohort of Children now in their early twenties!

However it's not all been plain sailing. We have had to weather many storms throughout the years including low birth rate, the Covid pandemic and currently, the serious lack of funding that our industry has been subject to, exacerbated by the rising cost of living. All factors have impacted on the number of children on roll. To counter this situation there have been long periods when our main Lead Practitioners have taken voluntary reductions in pay in order to maintain the viability of the setting. When several other local nurseries and preschools have closed under the financial pressure, Bramfield Stepping Stones has survived which can, in part, also be attributed to the understanding and support we have received from our landlords, the Village Hall Committee.

The lack of funding in Early Years is nationally taking its toll on the workforce, as it is not considered a lucrative profession to enter into, off set against the long hours of study to gain the necessary qualifications, responsibility required by the profession and high demands of Ofsted. Sadly, recruiting staff has become very difficult as a result of this.

Fortunately Bramfield Stepping Stones is in a very healthy position at present. The number of children on roll continues to rise steadily and even after the current cohort of children have left us for Primary School in September, we have an impressive list of children waiting in the wings.

I like to think that in our own little way Bramfield Stepping Stones has made a positive contribution to the village. Our Preschool parents often stop at Clarkes to stock up and several families, ourselves included, use the services of Bramfield garage. We feel very much part of the community. A bond which we hope to develop still further in the years to come.

Tree Warden report March 2023

Since 2017 the Bramfield hedge planting group have been planting hedges on David Thompson's land along Low Road and along the Halesworth road. This year we planted on Valley Farm, Low Road. Mick Hart offered a permissive footpath through a small copse where people could walk parallel to the road, enjoy views over the water meadow and avoid traffic on a narrow stretch of road.

We infilled the remnant hedge beside the road, using free trees from the Woodland Trust and the last length of weed suppressing membrane kindly donated by the Parish Council. We cut a footpath and then children from Bramfield Primary School came to plant trees along the route. We have also planted trees to thicken up the scrub areas. The pack chosen for planting was called 'Wild Harvest' and offered indigenous trees that produce nuts, berries and fruit for wildlife.

There are three old oak trees on the boundary of the area next to the meadows, the largest has a circumference of 4.40m. We decided to reduce the competition for these old oaks by cutting the small trees below and making them part of a dead hedge which defines the boundary.

We have also cleared a patch of brambles and seedlings that we hope will benefit from the increased light and support plants like moschatel which we found a patch of last year.

The stretch of hedge that we planted in 2019, opposite Valley Farm, suffered from last year's drought and we replaced trees that had not survived. Likewise, some trees in the 2018 stretch were also replaced.

All the planting then received a good dollop of horse manure.

We do not have a planting plan for 2023. There will be maintenance work to carry out on all the hedging as well as work parties to tend the copse and footpath. If the Bramfield Green project needs tree or hedge planting I am sure the group would be happy to get involved with that.
